TOMALES HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING MODERNIZATION PROJECT CEQA NOTICE OF EXEMPTION DISCUSSION

Project Description

Existing Facilities

The Tomales High School, located at 3850 Irvin Road in Tomales, CA is owned and operated by the Shoreline Unified School District. The school has an estimated current enrollment of approximately 155 students.

The school is at the north-eastern edge of the unincorporated Marin County town of Tomales, and is surrounded by large areas of agricultural/open space lands on all sides. A ranch complex and a large single-family residence are located about 250 feet north of the school. The school is about 1500 feet east of the Highway 1 and the town of Tomales business district.

Proposed Project

The project would consist of modernizations to the existing high school buildings and parking areas, including:

- Interior bathroom improvements, including interior demolition and reconstruction.
- Interior locker room improvements (both girls and boys locker rooms), including interior demolition and reconstruction and new ADA-accessible doors
- Stage, window, and door upgrades/replacements in school auditorium
- Interior ceiling tile demolition and replacement throughout the main school building
- Repair and/or replace leaking and damaged roof shingles; clean debris and moss from roof areas
- Fire alarm system upgrades
- Removing and replacing an ADA-accessible parking space and adjusting several other parking spaces, including new curbs and minor grading.
- Pedestrian walkway improvements
- New signage, consisting of new small signs in and on buildings and parking areas.

The project would be constructed in the spring and summer of 2020, with a proposed construction period extending from April through September.

Categorical Exemption Analysis

Class 1 Exemption

The CEQA Class 1 Exemption (Class 1-Existing Facilities [CEQA Guidelines, Section 15301]) applies to operation and minor expansions of existing facilities. It includes upgrades of existing building interiors and exteriors, demolition and removal of small structures,

addition of safety or health protection devices, restoration or rehabilitation of deteriorated structures, and additions to existing structures that will not result in an increase of more than 50% of the floor area before the addition, or 2500 sq. ft., whichever is less.

The proposed project would consist of minor renovations to existing school buildings on the site. As described above, it includes upgrades of existing building interiors and some exterior roofs, doors, and windows; interior demolition and replacement of existing bathroom and locker room facilities; minor exterior alterations to parking and walkways; and fire alarm upgrades. No expansions of classroom space, other interior spaces, or overall school capacity are proposed. Therefore, this exemption would apply.

Analysis of Possible Exceptions to Class 1 Exemption

The exemptions are subject to the following exceptions:

- **Cumulative Impact**. This exception would apply if the project were to contribute to significant impacts to a resource in combination with other proposed new development nearby. The proposed improvements are small in scale, and mostly interior modernizations. No other development is proposed at the school or in the neighborhood, so this exception would not apply.
- Scenic Highways. This exception would apply if the project were to result in damage to scenic resources within a scenic highway corridor. Tomales High School is about a quarter of a mile east of Highway 1, which is a designated State Scenic Highway in the project area. The proposed alterations of the existing classroom and the office building would be mostly in the building's interior; exterior improvements would be very small scale (limited to window and door replacements and parking lot alterations) and therefore not be visible from the highway. Therefore, it would not affect any scenic resources the designated scenic highway.
- **Hazardous Waste Sites.** This exception would apply if the project were to be located on a hazardous waste site listed pursuant to California Government Code Section 65962.5. A search of the State Envirostor database conducted on July 31, 2019, found no listed hazardous wastes sites on or near the school site. (https://www.envirostor.dtsc.ca.gov/public/map/?global_id=21880002)
- **Historical Resources.** This exception would apply if the project were to potentially significantly adversely affect an historical resource. The proposed project includes no substantial alterations to the existing school building (window, door, and roof replacements and repairs would be in the same locations and style as the existing elements to be replaced) and therefore would not have the potential to adversely affect any historical resources.
- **Significant Effect.** The exception would apply if the project would have the potential for a significant effect to the environment due to unusual circumstances. Unusual circumstances may include historic structures, hazardous

materials contamination, protected species or habitats, and other similar conditions. There are no unusual circumstances on the site and there is no potential for significant effect, therefore this exception would not apply.

<u>Conclusions</u>

As discussed above, the project is within the parameters of the Class 1 Categorical Exemption. Further, as detailed above, none of the exceptions to the exemption would apply. Therefore, this exemption would apply to the proposed project.

Background and Purpose

The Career Technical Education Facilities Program (CTEFP) was established by Article 13 of the *Kindergarten University Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2006*, Assembly Bill 127, Chapter 35, Statutes of 2006.

California *Education Code* (*EC*) Section 17078.72 authorizes the issuance and sale of state general obligation bonds to provide aid to local educational agencies (LEAs) to reconfigure, construct, or modernize Career Technical Education (CTE) facilities, and/or purchase equipment for CTE programs and to joint powers authorities (JPAs) to modernize CTE facilities and/or equipment.

Purpose of the Grant

Through a competitive grant process, the purpose of the Career Technical Education (CTE) Facilities Program is to provide matching funds for the purposes of CTE specific new construction, modernization, and/or equipment.

The California Department of Education recognizes CTE programs based on and as identified through the California Career Technical Education Model Curriculum Standards inclusive of 15 industry sectors and 58 pathways. Regardless of funding source, high quality CTE is measured by the 11 Elements of a High Quality Career Technical Education Program as defined in California State Plan for Career Technical Education. These 11 Elements include the following:

- 1) Leadership at all levels
- 2) High-quality curriculum and instruction
- 3) Career exploration and guidance
- 4) Student support and student leadership development
- 5) Industry partnerships
- 6) System alignment and coherence
- 7) Effective organizational design
- 8) System responsiveness to changing economic demands
- 9) Skilled faculty and professional development
- 10) Evaluation, accountability, and continuous improvement
- 11)CTE promotion, outreach, and communication

Consideration for Funding The CTEFP will provide grants up to \$3 million per new construction projects and \$1.5 million per modernization projects. An LEA must contribute an amount equal to the state-awarded grant. This local contribution may be provided by private industry groups, the LEA, or a JPA and may be paid over time per the State Allocation Board (SAB) approved payment schedule. The local contribution cannot be waived. The LEA is not required to demonstrate that it has un-housed pupils or that a permanent school building is more than 25 years old in order to receive a grant. However, the application will be subject to all other laws and regulations governing the School Facility Program.

Applications submitted to CDE will be reviewed and scored by two sets of readers who specialize in CTE programming and school facilities. The score is based on the average of the scores.

In order to be considered for funding, the application submitted must receive a minimum score of 105.

The OPSC will determine which CTE projects will be funded based on School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.196. Those selected CTE applications will be submitted to the SAB for approval.

Projects receiving funding through the CTEFP may have up to one year to obtain plan approval from the CDE and the Division of the State Architect (DSA). Plans must be consistent with the drawings submitted with the CTEFP application.

Criteria for Applying

Local educational agencies (LEAs) operating a comprehensive high school pursuant to Education Code sections 51224, 51225.3, and 51228 and having an active career technical advisory committee pursuant to Education Code section 8070 may apply for new construction grants or modernization grants. Funding expenditures identified in the application must be uniquely related to CTE.

A JPA ROP may only apply for modernization funding.

Independent charter schools and middle schools are not eligible to apply for CTEFP funding.

Applications submitted must address only one industry sector as a project is defined as one industry sector and at least one pathway (see Appendix C). Applications with multiple industry sectors **will not** be scored.

Additionally, projects that previously received CTEFP funding under Proposition 1D or a previous funding cycle under Proposition 51 may apply provided the project did not receive the maximum funding amount of \$1.5 million for a modernization project and \$3 million for a new construction project.

LEASE

This Lease ("Lease") dated as of July 1, 2019, is entered into between SHORELINE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ("Landlord or District") and the WEST MARIN LION'S CLUB ("Tenant") for the benefit of a teenage after school program.

Section 1

Premises

Landlord leases to Tenant and Tenant leases from Landlord a portion of the West Marin School, known as the "Teen Center," located at 11550 State Route 1, Pt. Reyes, CA 94956 ("Premises"), as specifically designated and depicted in **Exhibit** "A," which is incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 2

Term

The term of this Lease is for a period commencing on July 1, 2019 and ending on June 30, 2020. Tenant shall advise Landlord not later than April 1, 2020, if Tenant desires to extend the lease for an additional period. After having received such notice from Tenant, Landlord and Tenant shall meet prior to May 15, 2020, to discuss and evaluate to what extent each of their expectations were met with respect to the Leased Premises over the term of the Lease.

Section 3

Rental Term

(a) The rent shall be zero dollars (\$0) ("Rent") per month for the portions of the Premises as shown on **Exhibit "A."** Landlord shall keep the restrooms available for the use of Lion's Club users, and shall allow parking for Youth Center users. Tenant is responsible to pay the cost of all maintenance, repairs, and modifications of the Premises. Landlord shall provide all utilities. Tenant shall be responsible for janitorial services, and shall maintain the exterior of the Premises.

(b) <u>Possessory Interest</u>

It is understood that this Lease may create an interest subject to property taxation and Tenant may be subject to the payment of property taxes levied on such interest. Tenant shall pay, before they become delinquent, all charges, fees, taxes and assessments imposed on the Leased Premises by reason of Tenant's activities or use of the Leased Premises or any improvements or personal property located on the Leased Premises by or on behalf of Tenant. Landlord may pay such charges, fees, taxes or assessments, and such payments shall be repaid by Tenant on demand. The Premises are to be used to operate a Teen Center, and no part of the Premises shall be used for any different purpose. Tenant shall not do or permit any act to be done that will increase the existing rate or cause cancellation of insurance on the Premises or will cause a substantial increase in utility services normally supplied to the Premises. Tenant shall comply with all statutes, ordinances, regulations, and other requirements of all governmental entities that pertain to the occupancy or use of the Premises, and with all rules and regulations that are adopted by Landlord for the safety, care, and cleanliness of the Premises and the preservation of good order on the Premises. All such rules and regulations as now exist or that may be properly adopted by the Governing Board of Landlord at a regularly scheduled board meeting with Tenant having been given notice of, and an opportunity to comment upon, any proposed change in the rules and regulations are expressly made a part of this Lease. Additionally Teen Center staff is responsible for ensuring all Teen Center students while on any part of the West Marin Campus follow the established rules and regulations including restrictions of riding of bikes and skateboards.

Section 5

Alterations and Improvements

Tenant may make alterations or improvements to the Leased Premises at Tenant's own expense, after giving Landlord notice in writing of its intentions to do so and having obtained Landlord's written approval. All alterations or improvements shall be made in accordance with plans and specifications prepared in conformity with building industry standards applicable to commercial property in Marin County.

All of Tenant's trade fixtures, furniture, furnishings and other personal property, collectively referred to as "Personal Property" in this Lease, not permanently affixed to the Premises shall remain the property of Tenant. Tenant shall have the right to remove any or all of its Personal Property, which it may have stored or installed in the Premises. Tenant shall, at its expense, immediately repair any damage occasioned to the Premises by reason of the removal of any such Personal Property.

Section 6

Insurance

Tenant shall provide and maintain general liability insurance with limits of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence (Two Million Dollars general aggregate, if used) for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage arising out of the activities and properties as described herein. Coverage shall include contractual liability covering the Tenant's use of the property. The general liability coverage shall give Landlord, its officers, employees and authorized volunteers insured status using ISO endorsement CG2026 or equivalent. Tenant shall provide Landlord with a certificate of insurance and additional insured endorsement for scheduled use. Such insurance shall be primary and any insurance, self-insurance, or other coverage maintained by Landlord, its officers, employees or authorized volunteers shall not contribute to it. Coverage is to be placed with a carrier with an A.M.Best rating of A-:VII or equivalent, or as otherwise approved by Landlord.

Tenant shall insure, or be a qualified self-insured, with respect to the applicable laws relating to Workers' Compensation coverage (Labor Code §3700), all of Tenant's employees working on or about the leased premises. Tenant shall provide the Landlord with a certificate of Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance coverage to be placed with a carrier with an A.M.Best rating of no less than A-:VII or equivalent, or as otherwise approved by the Landlord. The Employer's liability limit shall be no less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each accident or disease.

If any of the above coverage expires during the term of this Lease, Tenant shall deliver the renewal certificate(s), including the general liability additional insured endorsement, to the Landlord at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.

Section 7

Default

Each of the following shall be an Event of Default under this Lease:

(a) If Tenant fails to make any payment required by the provisions of this Lease, when due;

(b) If Tenant fails within thirty (30) days after written notice to correct any breach or default of the other covenants, terms, or conditions of this Lease;

(c) If Tenant vacates, abandons, or surrenders the Premises prior to the end of the Term.

Section 8

Remedies

Upon the occurrence of an Event of Default under this Lease by Tenant, Landlord is entitled at Landlord's option to the following:

(a) To reenter and take exclusive possession of the Premises;

(b) To continue this Lease in force or to terminate it at any time;

(c) To take custody of all of Tenant's personal property on the Premises and to dispose of Tenant's personal property, and to apply the proceeds from any sale of Tenant's personal property to Tenant's obligations under this Lease;

(d) to restore the Premises to the same condition as received by Tenant, or to alter the Premises to make them suitable for reletting, all at Tenant's expense; and

(e) To enforce by suit or otherwise all obligations of Tenant under this Lease and to recover from Tenant all remedies now or later allowed by law.

Section 9 Maintenance and Repairs

Tenant acknowledges that the Premises are in fair and safe condition and, agrees to maintain the Premises in good and safe condition, including all interior surfaces of walls, windows, plate glass, doors, and ceilings, and all fixtures or equipment installed by Tenant. Tenant shall be responsible for maintenance of leased space. Tenant promises to surrender the Premises at termination of this Lease in the same condition as received, except for normal wear and tear and except for changes authorized by Landlord. Tenant agrees to make no repairs at the expense of Landlord.

Section 10

Severability

The invalidity of any portion of this Lease shall not affect the remainder, and any invalid portion shall be deemed rewritten to make it valid so as to carry out as near as possible the expressed intention of the parties.

Section 11

Assignment or Subletting

Any assignment or subletting of any portion of the Premises, whether by operation of law or otherwise, without prior written consent of Landlord is void and shall be a breach of this Lease, and, at the option of Landlord, shall terminate this Lease.

Section 12

Entry

Landlord reserves the right to enter the Premises at reasonable times to carry out any building management or business purpose in or about the building.

Section 13

Signs

In the event that Tenant desires to place any sign, notice, or display of any kind outside the Premises, Tenant shall first have the desired signage approved pursuant to Marin County's signage ordinance. After the signage has been approved by Marin County as complying with its signage ordinance, Tenant shall obtain the written consent of Landlord to the proposed signage.

Section 14

Indemnity

Tenant agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend Landlord from all claims and liability of every kind, including court costs and attorney fees, arising in any way from any occurrence on the Premises, or related to the use or occupancy of the Premises.

Section 15

Notices

Any notice under this Lease shall be given by mailing the notice, postage prepaid, by certified mail, return receipt requested, to Tenant at the Premises or any other address set forth adjacent to Tenant's signature below and to Landlord at the address set forth adjacent to Landlord's signature below, or to any other place designated in writing by the parties.

Section 16 Attorney Fees

In any action or proceeding by either party to enforce this Lease or any provision of this Lease, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney fees and all other costs incurred.

Section 17 Legal Effect

All obligations of Tenant are expressly made conditions of this Lease, any breach of which shall, at the option of Landlord, terminate this Lease.

Section 18 Titles

The titles or headings to paragraphs shall have no effect on interpretation of provisions.

Successors

The provisions of this Lease shall apply to and bind the heirs, successors, and assigns of the parties.

Section 20 Waiver

The failure of Landlord to enforce a provision of this Lease shall not be deemed a waiver for any purpose.

Section 21 Entire Agreement

This Lease, together with each attached exhibit, shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties, and may be modified only by a writing signed by the parties.

Section 22 Governing Law

This Lease shall be governed by and construed in accordance with California law.

The parties have executed this Lease on the date first written above with the following additional provisions for the 2018-2019 school year:

Tenant agrees to install exterior lighting and power for the purpose of providing lighting during the time the Youth Center is open and daylight savings has begun.

Tenant agrees to purchase and maintain an exterior storage shed at the southeast corner of the existing Teen Center portable to store excess equipment for the benefit of youth during non-school time. A location was agreed upon by District administration and maintenance staff.

Tenant agrees to maintain insurance for specific activities that relate to skateboarding and biking on campus so long as youth engaged in listed activity are enrolled in a club focused on bike and skateboard safety with a professional coach, in a designated area of the school campus and occurring within the Youth Center hours of operation.

Tenant agrees to provide in writing that the West Marin Lion's Club understands that Shoreline USD bicycle and skateboarding activities are subject to our \$12,000 high risk deductible (except safety programs).

Tenant will obtain a Certificate of Insurance with endorsement page from the West Marin Lion's Club, naming the District as additional insured.

The Status of Career Technical Education in Marin County

SUMMARY

In affluent Marin County there is an expectation on the part of parents that their children will attend and graduate from college. Schools have mirrored the expectations of parents and have stressed the importance of higher education for all students. This focus does not serve the interests of a substantial number of students who will complete their formal education with graduation from high school or who will not ultimately attain a college degree. The Marin County Civil Grand Jury understands that schools in the county have a two-fold mission: prepare students to succeed in post-secondary education (two- and four-year college degrees or formal certificate programs) or train them to go directly into the workforce.

Vocational training, now included in what is called Career Technical Education (CTE), is not promoted sufficiently to accommodate those students who could benefit from such programs. Although the educational establishment in Marin County has increased opportunities for this group, the workforce bound group may be unaware of the programs that exist. More can be done.

Currently, school counselors often focus on college choices and admissions. Our students would be better served if some of this valuable time was used in guiding students towards CTE offerings when appropriate. Similarly, career programs now center on vocations requiring extensive education — doctors, lawyers, engineers. Much more focus could be placed on CTE pathways — medical assisting, plumbing, auto repair.

Marin does not have sufficient facilities in place to train the numbers of students who are in the workforce bound group. To establish these programs is admittedly daunting, but it can be done. Such a program has existed for over a century at Silicon Valley Career Training Education, a high school focused on CTE located in San Jose. A similar campus in Marin could reach a broad range of students.

BACKGROUND

Traditionally, the purpose of secondary education has been to prepare those entering adulthood to proceed into the workforce or to continue on to colleges and universities. It has long been the desire of most Marin County parents to see their children leave high school bound for college. In response to this, most secondary education in this county has aimed at preparing children to successfully navigate this path.

Despite the desires of many of the parents, a substantial number of students, beyond those with special needs or severe disciplinary problems, do not leave high school and go on to achieve a degree or certificate in post-secondary education within six years of graduation. Vocational training, now called Career Technical Education (CTE), can be the pathway for many of these students. A Marin County Civil Grand Jury report on this subject was published in 2007.¹ The current Grand Jury attempted to ascertain how things have changed for these students since 2007.

APPROACH

The Grand Jury has obtained information presented through interviews, written questions and data available to the public. Interviews included county and school leaders, personnel directly working with the students in CTE, those working in post-secondary CTE programs, and potential employers looking for skilled workers. Websites are referenced with footnotes and include the Marin Promise Partnership, labor union agreements, as well as those of the MCOE, Silicon Valley Career Technical Education and College of Marin.

DISCUSSION

The Mission of High School

In general, the mission statements of Marin's high school and of the districts of which they are a part offer lofty phrases to express the need to instill a thirst for knowledge (See Appendix A). Words or phrases that appear in the descriptions include: creative, self-motivated, passionate, dignity, worth of each individual, embrace their own learning, think critically, experience, and success. These are all virtues that are associated with those who are capable of becoming successful in society.

Many members of our society lack some qualities from the list above and still lead productive and happy lives. One particular mission statement utilizes fewer of these words, yet, has a message that includes the student who will enter the workforce after achieving a high school diploma.

The Shoreline Unified School District, in partnership with the home and our rich diverse community, will prepare students for their future, assist them in becoming lifelong learners and enable them to reach their full potential as responsible, productive, and contributing members of society (emphasis added). The District will provide a safe educational environment in which students are actively engaged, excellence is expected, and differences are respected and valued.²

While Shoreline places greater emphasis on non-college bound students, each mission statement focuses on the entire student body. Terra Linda's statement, for example, says "every student receives an empowering education."³ Novato's hope is to "empower all students, in a rapidly changing world, to realize their life goals."⁴ Given that schools have a duty to prepare all students "for their future" and "enable [all] to reach their full potential," high schools have a dual mission to:

- Equip students with the tools needed to succeed in higher education.
- Prepare students to enter the workforce in a trade or vocation.

Acknowledging a dual mission may encounter resistance; most high schools in the county focus on preparing students to continue their academic education post high school. Educational leaders in Marin have said that they would always advise students to pursue further education after graduating from high school.

An exception to high schools advocating for post high school education is Marin Oaks High School. This school works with students who are not succeeding in the mainstream high schools. These students are currently not headed for a four-year college and the focus of this school is to

get students back on track to graduate from high school. These students have a high likelihood of going straight into the workforce and this school is focused on developing programs to prepare them for post high school employment.

Outcomes for High School Graduates

According to MCOE, Marin County high schools graduate about 2000 students per year. (2007: 1978 Students, 2017: 2107 Students, info provided by MCOE).

Approximately 77% (about 1500) of Marin County high school graduates go on to college or some form of post-secondary school training. In 2017, about half of graduating students enrolled in a four-year college or university. The balance of the 77%, presumably, attended community colleges or certificate programs.⁵

The number of students who complete post-secondary education is considerably smaller. On average only about 51% (less than 800) of the graduating high school students who go on to college or post-secondary training actually get a degree within six years of graduating from high school. This indicates that as many as 1200 students each year do not complete any formal post high school education. Thus, approximately half of our students will have to make a living with little or no formal education beyond what they will receive in high school.

Resources for High School Students Preparing to Enter the Workforce

The high schools in the county's four secondary school districts actually offer a broad array of courses aimed at preparing students for future careers. Appendix B provides a list from the MCOE of the CTE courses offered by the county's high schools. These offerings include courses aimed at college bound students as well as students who will be heading straight into the workforce.

In addition to the courses in Appendix B, several other opportunities offered by Regional Occupational Programs (ROP) and Schools to Career (STC) exist.⁶ These programs were covered extensively in the 2007 Grand Jury report.

Examples of current CTE opportunities include:

Construction Skills: Redwood High School provides a program for 10th through 12th graders to learn construction skills. This is an ROP program that runs for 18 Wednesday evenings from 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM and earns the same credits as a daily course for a semester. In this course, students learn basic construction skills as they construct a small structure.

A new program has started with a substantial grant from one of the large construction contractors in the area. Its goal is for high school seniors to gain a deeper exposure to the construction trades. Students take introductory courses in a variety of trades on Tuesday evenings and one Saturday a month; they finish with a two week "boot camp" in the summer after they graduate. The program's goal is to prepare students to enter one of the trades as an apprentice.

Virtual Reality: XR Marin is a 2000 sq. ft. Regional Training Center located at Hamilton for high school students and adults interested in virtual reality, augmented reality, mixed reality & 360-degree video. XR Marin is sponsored by the MCOE in partnership with the College of Marin, Novato Unified School District, and the Marin County Free Library.⁷

Medical Technicians: Kaiser Permanente offers a certificate program which will enable the successful student to be accepted for an entry level position as a medical assistant throughout the Kaiser Permanente network. The certificate is also recognized by other (but not all) medical employers. This program has been offered for approximately 15 years and is offered in conjunction with MCOE. Students from any Marin County high school are eligible to apply.

Tomales High School Welding Instruction: Tomales High has a robust welding program. Students are able to perform most welding skills from tack welding to cutting intricate designs and patterns from computer assisted metal cutting machines. Welding instruction is part of the agriculture department at Tomales.⁸ Because of its rural location, many of the students already have had exposure to the necessities of farm operations. Overall, the agricultural department at Tomales High School appears vibrant and successful in meeting the needs of students who plan on entering the workforce directly from high school or after receiving minimal continuing education.

Awareness of Programs

Little emphasis is placed on CTE opportunities by high school counselors. Interviews revealed that most counselors focus on post-secondary education while CTE opportunities are seldom addressed. Some schools have a specific counselor to handle these CTE opportunities, sometimes hired at the district level, but others seem to ignore them altogether. MCOE tries to mitigate this problem by providing additional counselors to augment those of the schools. More needs to be done.

School counselors often host group sessions to enlighten students about potential career paths. Most of the careers highlighted require a college education. Some effort is made to provide information as to potential careers not requiring a college degree, but not in relation to the number of students who would benefit from such a discussion. Marin Oaks has a program called *Bridges.*⁹ This year-long program provides students with resume preparation assistance, job interview training, internships, and guest speakers. Through Bridges, information on trade professions is provided though it appears that its main focus is upon preparing the student for success in college or post-secondary vocational programs. Though a laudable goal, it doesn't

seem to provide the student who seeks to obtain full time employment immediately about graduation with the necessary training. More needs to be done.

Obstacles to a Creating Comprehensive CTE Pathway

There are obstacles to setting up a truly comprehensive CTE pathway:

- Resources
- Eliminating the stigma associated with non-academic preparation

<u>Resources</u>: A large allocation of resources directed towards CTE would be required. Making every trade available at every high school is clearly impractical. Two or three specialty high schools (perhaps charter schools) might be set up for 11th and 12th graders. Alternatively, a single campus run by the MCOE to serve the entire county (as is done with the Silicon Valley Career Technical Education - see section below) might be more practical.

<u>Eliminating the Stigma:</u> Not everyone is destined to be a brain surgeon, lawyer, or practitioner of other prestigious professions. Based only on economic rewards, tradesmen often are richly rewarded. The median household income in California in 2017 was \$71,805.¹⁰ The union wage for a journeyman carpenter in Marin is \$46.40 per hour plus benefits.¹¹ Though not a direct comparison, a journeyman carpenter, if employed full time can earn a wage far above the median household income for California. If a student begins the training to become a journeyman carpenter while still in high school, journeyman status could be obtained before the age of 25. Our educational system can take the lead in instilling the idea that there is value and purpose in all productive pursuits. The value of starting the productive phase of life at a young age and without debt, can be instilled in our students.

A Model Program

In the Bay Area, a comprehensive program has stood the test of time. Established first in 1917, it is still going strong. This is the Silicon Valley Career Technical Education (SVCTE) program of the Metropolitan School District. This school district is a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) comprised of six school districts in Santa Clara County. The districts contain 41 high schools and approximately 100,000 students. The program has been at its current campus since 1965. This campus was built with state funds and is funded operationally by the member school districts.

SVCTE has one- and two-year programs covering 24 vocational areas. See Appendix C for a list of courses. Some of these tracks require post-high school formal education. Examples are the programs in firefighting, law enforcement, veterinary science, animation, and pharmacy. Most, however, prepare the student to either go directly into the workforce at a vocational level or go

on to additional formal education to enter at a professional level. The construction trades, automotive technology, fashion design and textile art, dental technology, film and video production are examples of these two-tiered programs. There is emphasis on internships and, over the years, a sizable network of partnerships has been built. Many of these partners provide students summer internships and many students are offered jobs on graduation. In the electrical and HVAC programs, local partners provide students who have a B grade or better tool kits valued at about \$750.

The program has a strong emphasis on employment soft skills: showing up on time, addressing your boss and teammates appropriately, dressing appropriately, and presenting yourself and your resume professionally.

Students at SVCTE continue to be a part of their local high schools and spend either their mornings or afternoons there with the balance of their day at SVCTE. Busses transfer students from the high school campus to SVCTE and back. The students cover the remaining core courses needed for graduation at their local school and the CTE courses at SVCTE.

Duplicating this program in Marin would face additional challenges. SVCTE has approximately 1600 to 1800 students drawn from 41 high schools. Marin County has only eight mainline high schools. SVCTE also had state funding in the sixties to purchase the land and build the facilities; this may not be available now. It is worth noting that the Novato School District has land at Hamilton and there may be facilities at IVC that could be modified for the purpose.

CONCLUSION

A century ago, many went into a trade at the age of sixteen. For decades through the midtwentieth century, a high school diploma was sufficient to gain entry into a trade that would support a family and give lifetime employment. Today, parents and educators feel that everyone needs a college degree to succeed. Is this approach wise? With only about half of those entering college actually getting a degree within six years, the waste in time and resources for those who do not seems staggering.

The educational establishment in Marin County has taken steps to increase opportunities for students who will be completing their formal education with a high school diploma. However, the students who will not go on to higher education or ultimately succeed in college are underserved in too many cases. Much more needs to be done to remove the stigma from non-academic pursuits and make students and their parents aware of the opportunities that exist.

FINDINGS

- F1. Marin County high schools' focus on preparing students to go to college poorly serves approximately half of the students who will not complete post-high-school formal training within six years of graduation.
- F2. Much of the career information presented to parents and students concerns opportunities for continued education in colleges and universities with little emphasis on available CTE opportunities, leaving workforce bound students and their parents unaware of the possibilities.
- F3. In each high school, counselors, except where there is a specialized counselor, generally do not have an in-depth knowledge of available CTE opportunities, limiting their ability to serve workforce bound students.
- F4. A lack of physical resources and coordinated programs for CTE programs in the county disadvantages students who want to pursue non-academically oriented careers.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- R1. During the 2019-2020 school year and annually thereafter, a career night should be offered at each high school for all students and parents featuring various CTE options as well as the more traditional offerings.
- R2. Throughout the 2019-2020 school year and annually thereafter, parents should be made aware of the income potential and career security enjoyed by people in the trades.
- R3. In the 2019-2020 school year and periodically thereafter, all high school counselors should receive in depth training in the available CTE opportunities to enable them to effectively counsel all students.
- R4. The Marin County Office of Education should establish a working group by December 31, 2019, to collaborate with local employers and other entities to create post high school career pathways.

The California State Legislature has stated that it intends the provisions of Penal Code Section 929 prohibiting disclosure of witness identities to encourage full candor in testimony in Grand Jury investigations by protecting the privacy and confidentiality of those who participate in any Civil Grand Jury investigation.

R1: During the 2019-2020 school year and annually thereafter, a career night should be offered at each high school for all students and parents featuring various CTE options as well as the more traditional offerings.

Response

The recommendation requires further analysis.

We agree that CTE options should be featured and promoted along with all other course offerings and opportunities for students. Analysis is needed to determine if there are existing events with widespread student and family attendance, such as open houses, or Back to School Nights that could provide an opportunity for featuring CTE information.

R2: Throughout the 2019-2020 school year and annually thereafter, parents should be made aware of the income potential and career security enjoyed by people in the trades.

Response

The recommendation requires further analysis.

Since earning potential and career security in the trades is directly related to formal post-secondary training and certification, opportunities will be identified to share information about apprenticeships and community college certification programs as part of the post-secondary transition process.

When the Board of Trustees approved the settlement agreement with the Shoreline Educators' Association, among the provisions was an annual cost of living increase for all stipends paid to certificated employees, as well as an agreement to codify all stipends that are paid to any certificated employee in the bargaining agreement.

The attached document lists all of the stipends paid to certificated employees, and the stipend amounts for the 2018-19, 2019-20, and 2020-21 school years. It also lists those stipends that have been paid in the past, primarily to certificated staff working at an elementary site, that have not been included in the bargaining agreement. These stipends have been individually negotiated in the past, between the site principals and selected individuals. While principals retain the right to name the individuals who receive the stipends, placing them in the contract in this manner assures that all certificated staff have knowledge of the opportunities and the related compensation.

Additionally, the attached document reflects a negotiated increase in the stipend paid to the high school teacher-incharge, reflecting the increased responsibilities that are part of the teacher-in-charge position at the high school.

In conversations with the Marin County Office of Education and the leadership of the Shoreline Educators' Association, we felt it best to ask the Board to formally approve the newly codified stipends in addition to the increase in the high school teacher-in-charge stipend. The previously codified stipends, and the COLA for them was approved when the Board voted to approve the settlement agreement. At that time, the newly codified stipends and the high school teacher-in-charge increase were not specifically included. They are included at this time, in **bold italics**.

I recommend that the Board act to approve the changes to the stipends as listed.

In the fall of 2018, the Board asked the voters of the District to approve a bond measure, providing funds for necessary facility repairs and upgrades at our five school sites and the Transportation Office. The voters approved the bond by a significant margin, likely based, in part, on the Board's and Administration's commitment to pursue quality and value in all projects.

In preparing projects for the summer of 2020, the Design Team (consisting of representatives of Axia Architects, Greystone West Construction Management, and the District), considered the option of proceeding with a "lease/lease back" program in order to extract the best value and quality from the contractors who will be completing the work.

Lease/lease back is a program outlined in Education Code Section 17406 (attached) that allows a school district "to let, for a minimum rental of one dollar (\$1) a year, to a person, firm, or corporation real property that belongs to the school district if the instrument by which this property is let requires the lessee therein to construct on the demised premises, or provide for the construction thereon of, a building or buildings for the use of the school district during the term of the lease, and provides that title to that building shall vest in the school district at the expiration of that term."

The Lease/lease back program specifically allows the District to engage in a "competitive solicitation process to the proposer providing the best value to the school district, taking into consideration the proposer's demonstrated competence and professional qualifications necessary for the satisfactory performance of the services required." In contrast to a competitive public bid process, the lease/lease back process does not require that the District accept the low bid, but rather can take into consideration other factors, such as demonstrated competence, quality of past work, references from other school districts, and ability to deliver a project within budget, among others.

The process for soliciting proposals is outlined in the cited Education Code Section, as well as in our own Administrative Regulation (AR 3311.2, also attached). This process calls for a request for proposals to be completed and distributed by the District in a specified manner. The process also describes the manner in which the District must publicly state the means in which these factors will be evaluated. A draft of such an RFP is also attached. Additionally, this process calls for the Board of Trustees to pass a resolution formally adopting the lease/lease back procedures as outlined in the Education Code and in our Administrative Regulation.

The obvious advantage to utilizing a lease/lease back process is to retain control over the selection of the contactor or contractors, rather than to be obligated to select the low bid regardless of other factors. Likely, the initial cost of

lease/lease back proposal would be slightly higher than one that would be submitted in a public works bidding process. The experience of the Design Team has been that such a differential nearly always disappears during the construction process, as change orders to the original bids are made. Proposals for lease/lease back projects, again in the experience of the Design Team, tend to have far fewer change orders for a number of reasons.

The nature of the lease/lease back program also allows the District to issue the RFP prior to project approval by the Division of the State Architect, allowing the contractor to become a part of the ongoing design process. Finally, it is the experience of the Design Team that contractors who have worked on lease/lease back projects are more inclined to be collaborative in order to keep a project within budget, while contractors who are awarded public bid projects face greater constraints.

I consulted with District Legal Counsel, and was provided with the attached resolution and RFP template. I was also advised by Counsel that the lease/lease back process is appropriate for the execution of projects authorized by general obligation bonds such as ours.

If you approve the attached resolution, and then act to authorize the issuance of the RFP, there will be two subsequent actions the Board must consider at future meetings. The first is a Lease/Lease Back Award Agreement Resolution, to be approved when a proposal is finally accepted, and the second is the Total Base Rent Agreement Resolution, to be approved when the contractor has provided the District with a total project cost.

The Board's action on this matter is necessary at this time, given the timeline for completion of this summer's construction projects (attached). As can be seen in the timeline, in order to have projects completed for the beginning of the 2020-21 school year by the third week in August, the distribution of the RFP must begin on November 25, 2020. This timeline, then, would allow the Board to award the project to the wining contractor at the February Regular Meeting of the Board.

I recommend that the Board approve the attached resolution to formally adopt the lease/lease back regulations, and then to authorize me to issue the Request for Proposals according to Education Code and our Administrative Regulations.

WHEREAS, for such lease-leaseback contracts, Education Code section 17406 requires the governing board of the school district to adopt required procedures and guidelines for evaluating the qualifications of proposers that ensure that the best value selections by the school district are conducted in a fair and impartial manner; and

WHEREAS, for such lease-leaseback contracts, Education Code section 17406 states that the best value process shall be a competitive procurement process where the contractor is selected on the basis of objective criteria for evaluating the qualifications of the proposers with the resulting selection representing the best combination of price and qualifications; and

WHEREAS, Education Code section 17406 requires that the lease-leaseback contractor selection process shall at a minimum include that statute's requirements.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the procedures and guidelines specified in Education Code section 17406(a)(2)(A)-(G) (see Exhibit A to this Resolution) are adopted for use when the Shoreline Unified School District seeks proposals for a public project using the lease-leaseback delivery method pursuant to Education Code section 17406.

Lease-Leaseback Contracts

AR 3311.2

Business and Non-instructional Operations

The district may lease currently owned district property to any person, firm, or corporation for a minimum of \$1 per year, as long as the lease requires the person, firm, or corporation to construct a building or buildings on the property for the district's use during the lease and the property and building(s) will vest in the district at the expiration of the lease ("lease-leaseback"). (Education Code 17406)

(cf. 3280 - Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property) (cf. 3312 - Contracts)

Any lease-leaseback contract shall be awarded through a competitive "best value" procurement process whereby a person, firm, or corporation is selected on the basis of objective criteria for evaluating the qualifications of proposers, with the resulting selection representing the best combination of price and qualifications. To make this determination, the

district shall use the following procedures: (Education Code 17400, 17406)

1. Request for Sealed Proposals: The Superintendent or designee shall prepare a request for sealed proposals which shall include:

a. An estimate of the project's price

b. A clear, precise description of any preconstruction services that may be required and the facilities to be constructed

c. The key elements of the contract to be awarded

d. A description of the format that proposals shall follow and the elements they shall contain

- e. The standards the district will use in evaluating proposals
- f. The date on which proposals are due
- g. The timetable the district will follow in reviewing and evaluating proposals

2. Notice: At least 10 days before the date for receipt of the proposals, the Superintendent or designee shall give notice of the request for sealed proposals using both of the following methods:

a. Providing notice at least once a week for two weeks in a local newspaper of general circulation pursuant to Public Contract Code 20112

b. Providing notice in a trade paper of general circulation published in the county where the project is located

The Superintendent or designee also may post the notice on the district's web site or through an electronic portal.

3. Prequalification: A proposer shall be prequalified in accordance with Public Contract Code 20111.6(b)-(m) in order to submit a proposal. Any electrical, mechanical, and plumbing subcontractors shall be subject to the same prequalification requirements. (cf. 3311 - Bids)

4. Evaluation Criteria: The request for sealed proposals shall identify all criteria that the district will consider in evaluating the proposals and qualifications of the proposers, including relevant experience, safety record, price proposal, and other factors specified by the district. The price proposal shall include, at the district's discretion, either a lump-sum price for the contract to be awarded or the proposer's proposed fee to perform the services requested, including the proposer's proposed fee to perform preconstruction services or any other work related to the facilities to be constructed, as requested by the district.

The request for sealed proposals shall specify whether each criterion will be evaluated on a pass-fail basis or will be scored as part of the "best value" score, and whether proposers must achieve any minimum qualification score for award of the contract. For each scored criterion, the district shall identify the methodology and rating or weighting system that will be used by the district in evaluating the criterion, including the weight assigned to the criterion and any minimum acceptable score.

5. Evaluation of Proposals: All proposals received shall be reviewed to determine whether they meet the format requirements and the standards specified in the request for sealed proposals. The district shall evaluate the qualifications of the proposers based solely upon the criteria and evaluation methodology set forth in the request for sealed proposals, and shall assign a best value score to each proposal. Once the evaluation is complete, all responsive proposals shall be ranked from the highest best value to the lowest best value to the district.

6. Award of Contract: The award of the contract shall be made by the Board of Trustees to the responsive proposer whose proposal is determined, in writing by the Board, to be the best value to the district.

If the selected proposer refuses or fails to execute the tendered contract, the Board may award the contract to the proposer with the second highest best value score, if deemed in the best interest of the district. If that proposer then refuses or fails to execute the tendered contract, the Board may award the contract to the proposer with the third highest best value score.

Upon issuance of a contract award, the district shall publicly announce its award, identifying the entity to which the award is made, along with a statement regarding the basis of the award. The statement regarding the contract award and the contract file shall provide sufficient information to satisfy an external audit.

7. Rejection of Proposals: At its discretion, the Board may reject all proposals and request new proposals.

Prior to entering into a lease-leaseback agreement, the Superintendent or designee shall have on file the contractor's enforceable commitment that the contractor and its subcontractors at every tier will use a skilled and trained workforce to perform all work on the project or contract that falls within an apprentice able occupation in the building and construction trades. (Education Code 17407.5)

Any lease-leaseback agreement shall be reviewed by the district's legal counsel to ensure that all required terms, including a lease term that provides for the district's occupancy of the building or improved property during the lease and an appropriate financing component, are included in the agreement. (a) (1) Notwithstanding Section 17417, the governing board of a school district may let, for a minimum rental of one dollar (\$1) a year, to a person, firm, or corporation real property that belongs to the school district if the instrument by which this property is let requires the lessee therein to construct on the demised premises, or provide for the construction thereon of, a building or buildings for the use of the school district during the term of the lease, and provides that title to that building shall vest in the school district at the expiration of that term. The instrument may provide for the means or methods by which that title shall vest in the school district before the expiration of that term, and shall contain other terms and conditions as the governing board of the school district may deem to be in the best interest of the school district.

(2) An instrument created pursuant to paragraph (1) shall be awarded based on a competitive solicitation process to the proposer providing the best value to the school district, taking into consideration the proposer's demonstrated competence and professional qualifications necessary for the satisfactory performance of the services required. Before awarding an instrument pursuant to this section, the governing board of the school district shall adopt and publish required procedures and guidelines for evaluating the qualifications of proposers that ensure the best value selections by the school district are conducted in a fair and impartial manner. These procedures and guidelines shall be mandatory for the school district when awarding an instrument pursuant to this section. The required procedures shall include, at a minimum, the following:

(A) The school district shall prepare a request for sealed proposals from qualified proposers. The school district shall include in the request for sealed proposals an estimate of price of the project, a clear, precise description of any preconstruction services that may be required and the facilities to be constructed, the key elements of the instrument to be awarded, a description of the format that proposals shall follow and the elements they shall contain, the standards the school district will use in evaluating proposals, the date on which proposals are due, and the timetable the school district will follow in reviewing and evaluating proposals.

(B) The school district shall give notice of the request for sealed proposals in the manner of notice provided in Section 20112 of the Public Contract Code and in a trade paper of general circulation published in the county where the project is

located, with the latest notice published at least 10 days before the date for receipt of the proposals.

(C) A proposer shall be prequalified in accordance with subdivisions (b) to (m), inclusive, of Section 20111.6 of the Public Contract Code in order to submit a proposal. If used, electrical, mechanical, and plumbing subcontractors shall be subject to the same prequalification requirements for prospective bidders described in subdivisions (b) to (m), inclusive, of Section 20111.6 of the Public Contract Code, including the requirement for the completion and submission of a standardized prequalification questionnaire and financial statement that is verified under oath and is not a public record. These prequalification requirements shall be included in an instrument created pursuant to paragraph (1).

(D) The request for sealed proposals shall identify all criteria that the school district will consider in evaluating the proposals and qualifications of the proposers, including relevant experience, safety record, price proposal, and other factors specified by the school district. The price proposal shall include, at the school district's discretion, either a lump-sum price for the instrument to be awarded or the proposer's proposed fee to perform the services requested, including the proposer's proposed fee to perform preconstruction services or any other work related to the facilities to be constructed, as requested by the school district. The request for proposals shall specify whether each criterion will be evaluated pass-fail or will be scored as part of the best value score, and whether proposers must achieve any minimum qualification score for award of the instrument under this section.

(E) For each scored criterion, the school district shall identify the methodology and rating or weighting system that will be used by the school district in evaluating the criterion, including the weight assigned to the criterion and any minimum acceptable score.

(F) Proposals shall be evaluated and the instrument awarded under this section in the following manner:

(i) All proposals received shall be reviewed to determine those that meet the format requirements and the standards specified in the request for sealed proposals.

(ii) The school district shall evaluate the qualifications of the proposers based solely upon the criteria and evaluation methodology set forth in the request for sealed proposals, and shall assign a best value score to each proposal. Once the evaluation is complete, all responsive proposals shall be ranked from the highest best value to the lowest best value to the school district.

(iii) The award of the instrument shall be made by the governing board of the school district to the responsive proposer whose proposal is determined, in

writing by the governing board of the school district, to be the best value to the school district.

(iv) If the selected proposer refuses or fails to execute the tendered instrument, the governing board of the school district may award the instrument to the proposer with the second highest best value score if the governing board of the school district deems it to be for the best interest of the school district. If the second selected proposer refuses or fails to execute the tendered instrument, the governing board of the school district may award the instrument to the proposer with the third highest best value score if the governing board of the school district deems it to be for the school district may award the instrument to the proposer with the third highest best value score if the governing board of the school district deems it to be for the best interest of the school district.

(v) Notwithstanding any other law, upon issuance of a contract award, the school district shall publicly announce its award, identifying the entity to which the award is made, along with a statement regarding the basis of the award. The statement regarding the school district's contract award and the contract file shall provide sufficient information to satisfy an external audit.

(G) The governing board of the school district, at its discretion, may reject all proposals and request new proposals.

(3) Following the award of an instrument created pursuant to paragraph (1), and if the price proposal is not a lump sum for the instrument awarded, the successful proposer shall provide the school district with objectively verifiable information of its costs to perform the services requested under the instrument and shall select subcontractors as set forth in paragraph (4). Once any preconstruction services are completed and subcontractors are selected, and upon approval of the plans and specifications for work on the site by the Department of General Services' Division of the State Architect, if required, the successful proposer and the school district shall finalize the price for the services to be provided under the instrument. The successful proposer shall provide the school district with written rationale for the price, and the school district shall approve or reject the final price at a public meeting before the successful proposer may proceed with any further work under the instrument. The contract file shall include documentation sufficient to support the final price determination.

(4) (A) The school district, in the request for sealed proposals, may identify specific types of subcontractors that must be included in the proposal. All subcontractors that are identified in the proposal shall be afforded the protections of the Subletting and Subcontracting Fair Practices Act (Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 4100) of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Public Contract Code).

(B) Following the award of an instrument created pursuant to paragraph (1) and for subcontractors not identified in the proposal, the successful proposer shall proceed as follows in awarding construction subcontracts with a value exceeding one-half of 1 percent of the price allocable to construction work:

(i) Provide public notice of availability of work to be subcontracted in accordance with the publication requirements applicable to the competitive bidding process of the school district, including a fixed date and time on which qualifications statements, bids, or proposals will be due.

(ii) Establish reasonable qualification criteria and standards.

(iii) Award the subcontract either on a best value basis or to the lowest responsible bidder. The process may include prequalification or short-listing. The process shall not apply to subcontractors listed in the original proposal. Subcontractors awarded construction subcontracts under this subdivision shall be afforded all the protections of the Subletting and Subcontracting Fair Practices Act (Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 4100) of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Public Contract Code).

(5) Nothing in paragraph (2) shall preclude a school district from segregating the request for proposals into a request for qualifications, followed by a request for proposals with price information from the proposers deemed most qualified by the school district, provided that the procedures specified in paragraphs (2), (3), and (4) are otherwise followed.

(b) (1) Notwithstanding Sections 17297 and 17402, for purposes of utilizing preconstruction services, a school district may enter into an instrument created pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) before written approval by the Department of General Services' Division of the State Architect only if the instrument provides that no work for which a contractor is required to be licensed in accordance with Article 5 (commencing with Section 7065) of Chapter 9 of Division 3 of the Business and Professions Code and for which Division of the State Architect approval is required can be performed before receipt of the required Division of the State Architect approval.

(2) Nothing in this subdivision waives the requirements of Section 17072.30 or Section 17074.16, or any other applicable requirements of Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10.

(c) A rental of property that complies with subdivision (a) as it reads on the day that the lease is entered into shall be deemed to have thereby required the payment of adequate consideration for purposes of Section 6 of Article XVI of the California Constitution.

(d) (1) This subdivision shall apply to a project for the construction, alteration, repair, or improvement of any structure, building, or other improvement of any kind that was leased through an instrument pursuant to this section before July 1, 2015. If at any time the instrument is determined to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction because it fails to fall within the competitive bidding exception pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a), as it read on December 31, 2016, the contractor who entered into the instrument with the school district

may be paid the reasonable cost, specifically excluding profit, of the labor, equipment, materials, and services furnished by the contractor before the date of the determination that the instrument is invalid if all of the following conditions, as determined by the court, are met:

(A) The contractor proceeded with construction, alteration, repair, or improvement based upon a good faith belief that the instrument was valid.

(B) The school district has reasonably determined that the work performed is satisfactory.

(C) Contractor fraud did not occur in the obtaining or performance of the instrument.

(D) The instrument does not otherwise violate state law related to the construction or leasing of public works of improvement.

(2) In no event shall payment to the contractor pursuant to this section exceed either of the following:

(A) The contractor's costs as included in the instrument plus the cost of any approved change orders.

(B) The lease payments made, less profit, at the point in time the instrument is determined to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction.

(3) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), this subdivision shall not affect any protest and legal proceedings, whether contractual, administrative, or judicial, to challenge the award of the public works contract, nor affect any rights under Section 337.1 or 337.15 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

(e) This section shall become inoperative on July 1, 2022, and, as of January 1, 2023, is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that becomes operative on or before January 1, 2023, deletes or extends the dates on which it becomes inoperative and is repealed.
